U.S. and EU Leaders to Meet in Brussels, Discuss Trade

While President Joe Biden is in Europe for the G7 summit, he will also be meeting with his EU counterparts to discuss a variety of issues including reforms to the World Trade Organization and mending trade relationships. In addition to President Biden, U.S. Trade Representative Katherine Tai will travel to Brussels for negotiations with European trading partners on the Large Civil Aircraft dispute.

In light of these meetings, the CIAA and European Dairy Association are sending a joint letter to Ambassador Katherine Tai and EU Executive Vice President Valdis Dombrovskis. The joint letter applauds the governments for the current tariff suspension, but urges a swift resolution to the dispute and if that is not possible before July 11 for the governments to continue the tariff suspension. The CIAA and EDA see these meetings as a unique opportunity to re-shape our trade relationship.

Progress on Resolution of Dispute with UK

Additionally, the U.S. and UK issued [a joint statement](#) discussing the new “global vision” of the relationship between the two countries. The statement included points on how to further and deepen the trade relationship of the U.S. and UK, including a seeking a resolution to the LCA.

Specifically, the statement said, “We commit to the rapid settlement of the Large Civil Aircraft dispute. . . . We will therefore work closely to identify and pursue opportunities to deepen our already extensive trade relationship.”

The CIAA continues to monitor developments related to this trade dispute and keep

INDUSTRY DATES TO REMEMBER

JULY 1, 2021

Last day for an exporting country that is not designating importers for calendar year 2021 to notify FAS.

AUGUST 31, 2021

Last day to enter dairy products into U.S. Customs territory that may be used to qualify and establish eligibility for a calendar year 2021 license.

SEPTEMBER 1, 2021

First day of license eligibility period for next quota year-plus one. Example: entries made on or after September 1, 2021 can be used to establish eligibility for a license for calendar year 2022.

SEPTEMBER 1, 2021

Last date to request globalization of a calendar year 2020 license. First transmission date for applications for reallocated license amounts for calendar year 2020. First transmission date for all applications for calendar year 2021 licenses.

SEPTEMBER 15, 2021

(no exceptions!) Last transmission date for licensees applying for reallocated license amounts for calendar year 2021.

OCTOBER 1, 2021

(no exceptions!) Last transmission date for licensees to surrender all or the unused portion of their calendar year 2021 licenses.

OCTOBER 15, 2021

(no exceptions!) Last transmission date for all applications for calendar year 2022 licenses.

OCTOBER 31, 2021

Exporting countries that are designating U.S. importers for calendar year 2022 must submit their designations to FAS by this date.

NOVEMBER 5, 2021

DECEMBER 20, 2021

(approximately) FAS issues first notice of calendar year 2022 licenses to licensees.

DECEMBER 31, 2021

Last day for licensees to make entries to fulfill the requirement to use 85% of their calendar year 2021 license amount. Last day for which calendar year 2021 licenses are valid
